

From the Vicar: Living faithfully in a complex world.



The season of Lent begins next week with Ash Wednesday, when we are brought once again face to face with our frailty and our mortality, and thus, with our utter dependence on God. We are called to turn to God, and this starts with the realization that all of us are pilgrims in this life. We are invited to bring to God our journey through everyday life, as well as our questions as to how God is at work in the unfolding of events in our lives and the wider world. As the world around us seems more unpredictable, with forces gaining sway that are inimical to what many of us hold as core to our faith, it feels the more important that we do less and pray more, if we can. That will mean different things to each of us, but at heart it is about genuinely listening to God. I would like to encourage all of us to make some space this Lent for time with God, for prayer and reflection, for us to journey through life more intentionally as people of faith.

The Church of England theme this Lent is 'Living Hope'. Information about resources for daily reflection and prayer can be found on the <u>Living Hope website</u>. For example, you can subscribe to receive a daily email or download the App, to access daily bible readings, short reflections and a practical challenge. In this eMag, you will find four Lent book recommendations, trusting that one of them may feel relevant to where you are at on your journey. The clergy welcome your feedback on these suggestions.

An important dimension of Christian life is to journey *together*. Here at Great St Mary's, we do that by participating in our weekly rhythm of prayer, worship, bible and other study groups, as well as in the fellowship we share and the conversations we have with each other. I am grateful to David Grummet for organising the retreat to the Coptic Church Centre on 14 March, which is open to all.

The Wednesday lunchtime Lent talk series this year is on the theme of 'living faithfully in a complex world', with five local speakers who are practically involved in areas of social justice education and transformation. This theme is also central to the 'Big Church Read' Lent book 'Wild, Bright, Hope', which we featured in the last eMag. It contains twelve stories of community and faith engagement in diverse contexts which seek to inspire us to reflect on our own journey in life and where we find hope. Please, let me know a.s.a.p., if you would like to join a group to explore the themes in this book together.

My prayer for us as a church and for all who are part of Great St Mary's is that this holy season may indeed be a time for us to grow in faith, in hope and in love, as we journey with Jesus to the cross on Good Friday and beyond, to the transformation on Easter Day. May we be people of hope and of God's kingdom.

After the event, there will be the opportunity for children to sign up for a voice-trial to join the Great St Mary's Choristers. We are holding auditions on 29 March and 19 April 2025. We are currently recruiting children who will be in Years 3 and 4 from September 2025. (We typically take 3 boys and 3 girls in each year group). We also have places for boys currently in Year 5, who would be able to join mid-year. At a voice trial, we ask

## GSM Electoral Roll - PLEASE READ

New Electoral Roll for the Parish of St Mary the Great with St Michael, Cambridge


Every six years, we have to assemble an entirely new electoral roll, in accordance with Church Representation Rules. 2025 is such a year. Everybody who wishes to have their name on the new roll must apply to be enrolled. Joining the Electoral Roll is also a way of showing your support for Great St Mary's and to participate in the governance structures of the parish, if you wish to do so, as it is the register of lay persons who are eligible to vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) and to stand for election to the Parochial Church Council (PCC). This year's APCM will be held on Sunday 18 May, and the new roll must be completed by then.

Church Rules require us to follow a very specific timetable, which will start with the display of a formal Notice in Great St Mary's and in Michaelhouse on Tuesday 11 March 2025. Applications, which can be made on paper or electronically, must be in the form specified. From 11 March a copy of that form can be accessed via a button on the home page of our website www.greatstmarys.org and there will be paper forms available in GSM and in Michaelhouse. The new Electoral Roll will be published on Friday 2 May, online and in hard copy in Great St Mary's and Michaelhouse. It will show names, but no other information, and must remain on display for at least 14 days prior to the APCM. Only those whose names are included in this new Electoral Roll will be entitled to stand for election or to vote at the APCM.

We hope that you will renew your membership of our Electoral Roll, or join for the first time. Please do not hesitate to contact the Electoral Roll Officer, Joanna Womack, or speak to the clergy, if you have any questions. It is really important that we gather together on the new Electoral Roll the names of all those who wish to exercise their rights in the Parish.






#### **Lent Books for personal reading and Group Study:**

Wild Bright Hope: Reflections on Faith - the Big Church Read Lent Book 2025
This Lent book brings together 12 dynamic voices, each contributing a unique chapter on the power of hope. The 12 contributors share what gives them hope in the areas in which they work. They include a teacher, an advisor on economics and social welfare, an international reconciliation and mediation practitioner, a community organiser. River through the Desert: A Lenten journey in the Holy Land by Richard Sewell Richard Sewell, Dean of St. George's College, Jerusalem, wrote this series of meditations during the COVID pandemic, inviting us to reimagine what it means to travel with Jesus during Lent. In weekly reflections, Richard Sewell takes readers step by step through a landscape riven with the traces of God. A great way to be enriched by the special character of the Holy Land.



Healing Wounds: The 2025 Lent book by Erik Varden

This Lent Book, draws on the New Testament to spell out why Christ's wounds are efficacious for the healing of humankind. Structured to guide readers through a journey


of reflection, beginning with the raw reality of suffering and moving toward the possibility of redemption and renewal, Varden employs a contemplative tone, inviting readers to sit with their own experiences of pain and consider how these might be transformed through faith and introspection.



Searched me out and known me: Journeying Lent with the Psalms by Charlie Bell Over 15 chapters the following Psalms and corresponding themes are explored: 51 (Preparation, Repentance, Reflection, and Sin); 91 (Reliance); 102 (Lament); 32 (Sanctification); 34 (Abundance); 23 (Service); 118 (Power); 103 (Fear); 16 (Doubt); 55 (Betrayal); 116 (Companionship); 22 (Faith and Hope); 130 (Watching and waiting); 85 (Redemption through love). Each chapter is built around one of the above psalms, the day's Gospel according to the Church of England's lectionary and concludes with the Church of England's daily collect. Beyond the first chapter, it aims to offer readers a reflection on the psalm and reading, some discussion around a theme, thematic prayers, and further questions.

### **Pastoral Care**



### Pastoral Care at Great St. Mary's

At Great St Mary's we are committed to the care and nurture of all members of our church community. Pastoral visitors are one aspect of how our church fulfils this commitment to pastoral care.

#### What is Pastoral Care?



The word **pastoral** as we know it today evolved in the

context of the church. In the late 6th century Pope Gregory I wrote a classic guide (Regulae Pastoralis Liber) which gave instruction about the priests' duty to attend to the 'care of souls', including providing instruction, taking confession, and administering the sacraments. The guidance was of course modelled on the example of Jesus as shepherd and servant.

The term pastoral care is now used more widely also in secular settings such as social work, schools and colleges, to describe holistic support of individuals and is often overseen by named people in a pastoral team. Specifically, Christian pastoral care is ultimately concerned with developing quality relationships, so enabling one another to recognise, follow and become more like Jesus Christ. It is a commitment to love one another because we ourselves are first loved by God, and embraces a wide range of

activity in support of one another, in and beyond the church.

Pastoral care might involve:

- sustaining others through prolonged difficulty or immediate need
- enabling the journey of healing and wholeness
- considering the process of reconciliation with God, self and others
- offering guidance about other resources and enabling different perspectives
- offering holy communion (either directly or by extension) in the home setting
- praying for others

#### **Great St Mary's Pastoral Care Group**

Pastoral care can be offered informally by each of us to others from time to time, as explained above. In addition to this very important aspect of the Christian calling of us all, at Great St Mary's, we have a team of appointed pastoral visitors drawn from the ministry team and the wider congregation. Together they share a more formal responsibility for pastoral care of others.

The GSM Pastoral Care Group consists of 13 people who are drawn to this ministry and whose pastoral abilities and integrity have been recognised by others. Each member of the group contributes to monthly meetings in which pastoral concerns are shared in confidence and in which home visits to those who might most benefit from them are planned. Each member of the group agrees to abide by a role description and also undertakes regular training in safeguarding as stated in the role description. We also are planning training events which might be of interest to the wider GSM community (e.g. on Dementia Awareness, Falls Prevention and Talking about the End of Life). The current Pastoral Team Leader is Ally Barrett.

#### Intercessors at Home

The Home Intercessors are a group of 19 appointed people who each are prepared to faithfully commit themselves to praying (individually at home) for particular requests, in absolute confidence. The Home Intercessors are each sent, by email, a prayer list (updated approximately weekly). This includes personal prayer requests, upcoming baptisms, weddings and funerals, the year's mind list for the week, the Wider Concerns charities which we are supporting at GSM and topics from the GSM monthly prayer calendar for that week. The personal prayers on the Home Intercessors list are treated with great respect and are not shared outside the group.

#### Intercessions in Church

You might have noticed that after a period of not praying for people by name in our livestreamed services, we have re-introduced prayers for individuals. All prayers in public services are only made with the permission of the person being prayed for, and we pray for that person by Christian name only.

Project 'Sleeping Beauty' is underway. You may have noticed that the area to the left of the west door has been cleared, and replanted with shrubs, perennials and bulbs. (The shrubs are, from left to right, an Abelia grandiflora, a Daphne odora, a Euonymus and a Choisya). When it is a little warmer, we hope to plant some wildflowers and annuals. What all these plants have in common, is that they are attractive to pollinating insects, and flower at different times of the Already some primroses (from Sarah Goff's garden) have started flowering and some of the bulbs are beginning to shoot up, but it will take a long time, years, before it all looks really established.

Last week, a team of gardeners braved rain and bitter cold, to prune, fertilise and manure all the roses in the churchyard. See above:Katya, Juliet, Sarah and Katrina beside the climbing rose to the right of the south porch.



### **Eco Tip - Fair Trade**



Churches have been at the forefront of promoting fair trade products for decades, making the

connection between trade and poverty and committing to using fairly traded goods such as tea, coffee and sugar. There are a few well-recognised certifications. In looking for international products which are fairly traded and ethically sourced, seek out those which have the Fairtrade 'mark' or the Rainforest Alliance 'seal'.

Great St. Mary's intends to be part of this campaign by registering with the Fairtrade Foundation and making commitments to: 1. Use Fairtrade products wherever possible; 2. Celebrate Fairtrade Fortnight (more on this in September); and 3. Engage with other Fairtrade events and connect with community groups.

The Princess Basma team in Gaza is reunited and is still growing

"We cherish all good news these days. And so we celebrate the safe arrival of our two displaced therapists from southern Gaza to join their colleagues at our satellite unit in Gaza City. We are also delighted that they are joined by a seventh team member, Ala'a our new Speech and Language therapist. This means that we can truly embrace our multidisciplinary model of rehabilitation and treat children with complex needs and their families holistically and in one place. Our Princess Basma team in Jerusalem continues to provide crucial support and supervision for them online. Last week, the Gaza team joined the Jerusalem team virtually in their training on how to work with children with amputations. Very special thanks to everyone who supported us throughout 2024 with your thoughts, prayers and generous giving".


