From the Vicar – PCC Imaginings and Stewardship



Last Sunday's University sermon had the intriguing title 'The Epiphanic Imaginings of the Church. Bishop Anderson Jeremiah preached an inspiring sermon [1], reminding us of God's vision for the world, which we celebrate at Christmas and Epiphany. He said: 'Epiphany is the season when we rejoice in the revelation of God's glory to all people. ...We joyfully anticipate the time when God dwells among God's people, which will

enable everyone to experience the freedom, joy and love that define God's very being. ... It is God's ongoing work of redemption, weaving together of a beautiful tapestry.' Bishop Anderson encouraged us not to be dragged down by the many challenges of our time, but to use our imagination, of how things could be, and to live our lives with God's vision and purposes in mind. Each one of us can make a difference wherever we are, however small that may feel, and together, by God's grace, we can be agents of real transformation.

I continue to be amazed by, and grateful for, the life and potential of Great St Mary's, our calling to be a place of welcome, prayer and hospitality for an incredible variety of people. Perhaps, this is most powerfully visible when we gather for the Eucharist on Sunday mornings – people of all ages gathered, from many different walks of life, backgrounds and countries – a glimpse of the kingdom of God at work as we share in worship and communion together. When we leave Church after the Eucharist, we are invited to love and serve the Lord. It's a powerful vision to think we have received the 'body of Christ' to then go and live to be the body of Christ in the world.

Three weeks ago, twenty members of the Parochial Church Council gave up a Saturday to pray, imagine and start exploring how we would like to develop and grow as a Church in the next five to ten years. We identified a number of priority areas, while continuing to build on what we do well, for example, worship, music, ministry with children and young people, pastoral care and advocating for the environment. We are in the process of setting up working groups for music development and outreach, welcome and accessibility and digital presence. We continue to engage with our calling to be the University Church and want to be part of the City's market square development and the opportunities this presents. This is an exciting and ambitious undertaking, and we hope that everyone who is part of Great St Mary's will want to contribute in some way – be it through their regular prayer for us, their financial support, their time and talents.

We are launching a stewardship campaign this week, which begins with a heartfelt Thank You to everyone who is part of Great St Mary's and gives so generously of their time, talents and money. It is an invitation for everyone to prayerfully consider how they can support us in the year ahead. Our personal giving is part of how we express our faith, how we live 'in the light of God's emerging future, God's Now and Not Yet' (Bishop Anderson), and how we enable the life of the body of Christ at Great St Mary's to be sustained, strengthened and enriched.

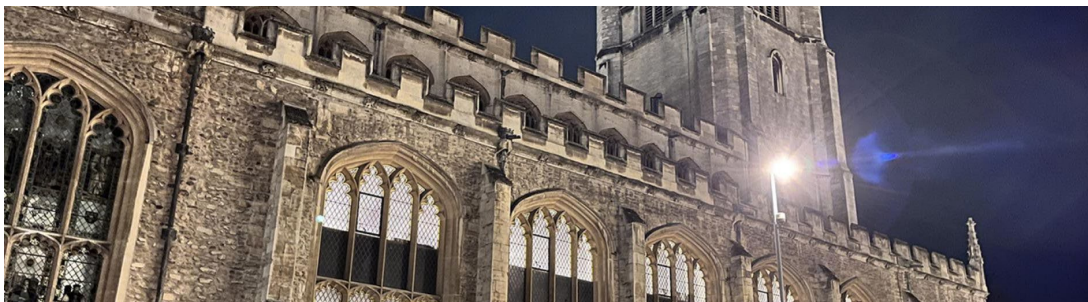

Michaelhouse Singers

Did you know that Great Saint Mary's supports a Community Choir? The **Michaelhouse Singers** was founded in 2008 by the Friends of Michaelhouse in association with the charity *Art and Minds*, and has established itself as an important wellbeing resource serving the city of Cambridge and beyond. Singers of all ages and all abilities, all faiths and none come together each week to sing a wide-ranging repertoire from early music to pop. All are welcome, there are no auditions, and there is a friendly, supportive and welcoming atmosphere. Members include, or have included, those with dementia, their friends and carers, and some singers with mild to moderate anxiety have found the choir a valuable resource. A group from the choir often stays for tea in the Michaelhouse café after rehearsal and all value this social time.



The choir performs a concert towards the end of each term in the Michaelhouse Chapel, when friends and family are invited to attend and enjoy the fruits of the term's work. Rehearsals are at 2.30 pm in the Michaelhouse Chapel during school terms, and last for an hour. Read what some members say about the choir:

I find choir really invaluable. Everyone is very accepting and welcoming. The singing is really uplifting, and we sing a wide range of songs, so there is something for everyone.

Tonga talk



Some reflections on my time in Tonga

Malo e leilei from the “Friendly Islands” - so named by Captain Cook after his visit here 1733. That’s certainly been my experience also. I arrived here on a Saturday and was warned that everything closes on Sunday, that was no exaggeration. Fortunately, there was no shortage of churches, even before I was properly awake I heard sweet melodies floating in the tropical breeze. I’ve been to the Wesleyan church, the Pentecostal church and the Anglican Church. I’ve yet to sample the Church of Tonga. The 40-minute sermon in Tongan is a bit challenging but I think I get the general drift. This is a deeply religious country though, where they truly believe in Psalm 33,12 “blessed is the nation whose God is the lord, the people whom he chooses for his inheritance “

The main island, Tongatapu, where the clinic is based is surprisingly underdeveloped as a tourist destination, I think this is also true of the other 40 or so inhabited islands in the archipelago. I’m told that the triple whammy of a category 4 cyclone (2018) followed by Covid (2020) and the tsunami (2022), has destroyed many of the popular resorts and, being a poor country is taking a while to recover.

The Village Mission Clinic is surprisingly well organised and stocked, courtesy largely from New Zealand charity. I’m the only doctor here, working alongside a Pharmacist and nurse. There is a modern hospital about 3 miles away, built by the Japanese. There are other clinics in town, but none with a GP, these are specialists. Tonga doesn’t have any specialists in Haematology, Oncology, Orthopaedics, Neurology or Dermatology, which is a little unnerving.

The patients I see in the clinic aren't really that different to those in Cambridge, a bit larger perhaps and a bit more diabetic but generally, they just seem grateful to have a doctor from abroad and accept their lot stoically. They still seem to need sick notes here, which I thought I might have escaped from. Continuity of care is a problem, as lots of patients shop around different doctors until they find an opinion they are happy with! They pay the equivalent of £10 to see us plus the cost of any medication on top. Most of them however don't have a clue what medicine they are on, let alone why they are taking it, which is a bit frustrating.

Anyway, I'm enjoying the experience and look forward to boring you all on my return

Crib service Christmas Eve – £750 to **Blue Smile** - helping children with mental health issues. *“I feel like I have brightness in me again and happiness.”*

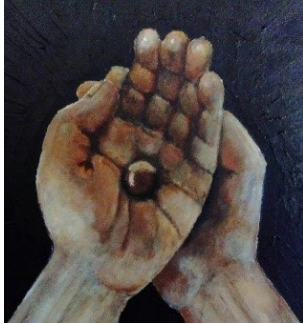
WCC envelope collection £1,435 divided between the **Ukraine Red Cross**, with the relentless conflict, and **Centre 33** helping vulnerable young people.

Intercessions Workshop - Feb 4th

Leading intercessions - Saying prayers on behalf of the people at Great St Mary's



Ever since Christian communities first began to gather to share the bread and the wine in the eucharist, a part of the service was set apart for making prayers to God on behalf of the people. Prayers said in this way are known as **intercessions**. The eucharist services we follow at 10am on Sundays in Great St Mary's have a predictable four-part shape, described in our service sheets as the **Gathering, the Liturgy of the Word, the Liturgy of the Sacrament and the Dismissal**. It might be obvious from these titles that the Gathering and the Dismissal and the parts of the service to do with welcoming and preparation, and then being made ready to go out into the world; these form a sandwich around the two central elements of Word and Sacrament. In the Liturgy of the Word we hear the readings, the Gospel, and the sermon, say the Creed together and then come the Intercessions. The Liturgy of the Sacrament begins with the Peace, and then comes the preparation of the altar and offering of the eucharist.

This means that the Intercessions and the Peace, both aspects of the service requiring active participation of the people, are located around a profound axis point in the service as we turn from considering God's Word and the needs of the world, to the sacred work of coming together to celebrate Christ's presence amongst us. This centrality reflects the importance of both of these parts of the service, parts in which everyone is invited to have an active role. It is traditional for the intercessions to be led by a member of the congregation, to remind us that making formal prayers to God (both a "duty and a joy" as Cranmer describes it in the Book of Common Prayer) is not for the ministers alone, it is something which all of us can participate in during worship. Ideally, the intercessions help us to form our own prayers so that we both focus on God and God's many qualities, and bring to God a wide range of needs, including the day ahead and each other, the worldwide church communities, the needs of the world and the sick and the dying. This both engages us in our relationship to God, but also helps us learn how to pray in our private times of prayer, by stretching us to consider those situations which we might otherwise forget about. Praying together helps form holy habits which bring Christian communities closer together, as well as open us to being more

concerned about others.

The workshop will be designed to be of interest to anyone who wants to learn more about using structured prayers even if this might be solely for times of personal prayer. For those who would be open to taking a turn in leading intercessions in our services, then the workshop will offer you guidance and resources to equip you to do this with confidence.

What will be included in the Intercessions workshop?

- How to pray about difficult things
- Different ways of structuring prayers
- How to pray for lots of things without it sounding like a list
- How to connect the intercessions with the readings, sermon and the hymns
- Praying in a way that helps other people pray
- Using space and silence

The workshop will be supported by a printed guide, which will include sample prayers, templates, further reading and other online prayer resources.

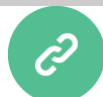

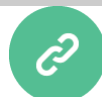
