#### From the Vicar



Sincere thanks to our Licensed Lay Minister, Dr David Grumett, for organising a retreat day to the Coptic Orthodox Church Centre in Stevenage, at the invitation of His Eminence Archbishop Angaelos, the Coptic Archbishop of London. I was on my annual retreat at the Anglican Benedictine monastery at Mucknell Abbey, sorry not to be with the group in Stevenage, but grateful for

the time I had to rest, pray, be nourished and blessed by the hospitality of the community in Mucknell.

In our busy, noisy world, where we are constantly bombarded with all kinds of information, it can be difficult to carve out time to rest, reflect, be quiet and be in touch with ourselves and God. For some, coming away on retreat may feel like a strange, unfamiliar thing to do, but those who attend our annual quiet day in September, or a retreat day like the one in Stevenage, find themselves richly blessed.

Here are some reflections of participants of the retreat at the Coptic Orthodox Centre: The hospitality and warm welcome throughout the day was much appreciated. This included a talk by the parish priest on the Coptic icons in the Centre; an address by the Archbishop and, of course, a lovely lunch. To bring the day to a fitting close, the group were able to celebrate communion in the original chapel, with Revd Shirley presiding. Being able to learn about the history and traditions of other Christian denominations felt deeply enriching. One person said "the simplicity of the Cathedral with its striking icons, some with different symbols to ones we have in the Anglican church, for instance, peacocks not pelicans as symbols of Christ's blood shed, and the only crucifixes being small and almost 'insignificant' seemed to speak of difference. I found myself reflecting on the Coptic church of which I knew little, and I can see that in many ways our likenesses are so much greater than our differences. The genesis of our churches is different and we bear the customs and practices birthed in these places but our shared humanity, as Christian pilgrims, as we journey on the



path of seeking to know God is just the same." The retreat day included space to be quiet, reflect, pray. It offered "an oasis of calm in which to read, reflect and pray, in a beautiful building designed with care and love and full of glorious icons. This was such a blessing at a time when the world around us is so full of woe." Everybody was grateful to David Grummet for organising "this almost out-of-body experience", as one participant described it. She felt that it had been a real 'holy' day and would encourage people to take up the opportunity to attend if another visit is organised in the future.

I very much hope that we will be able to arrange another visit to the Coptic Church Centre in Stevenage, as well as other forms of retreat or pilgrimages to enrich our Christian lives and deepen our journey with God.


# 👫 Easter Garden

# GSM Christian Meditation Group

The Christian Meditation group meets weekly in the beautiful setting of the Hervey de Stanton chapel (in the south-east corner of Michaelhouse) on Mondays at 12.30pm. This 30 minute service is an opportunity to pray with others. Topped and tailed by introductory prayers and readings, a guided time of preparation and an opportunity to reflect, we sit together for 20 mins – in silence. For those who can stay, there is an option of a simple shared soup lunch at 1pm.

The intention of Christian meditation is to rest in the presence of God and in attentive awareness of being held in God's love. Over time, many people find that a dedicated practice of silent prayer (this can be for as little as 20 minutes or so a day) will



profoundly shape the way day-to-day life is experienced, as the presence of God and God's love becomes more deeply known. In silent prayer we put our trust in the action of the Holy Spirit who "helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with sighs too deep for words" (Romans 8:26).

One of the challenges confronting those who begin Christian meditation is experiencing very directly the constant stream of seemingly random thoughts and accompanying emotions which arise. Our human tendency is to engage with thoughts, a bit like entering a conversation. But with practice, over time, we learn in silence simply to notice a thought arising, and to make the choice not to engage with it. Gradually our minds quieten, and the emotions are stilled. We learn to focus on the stillness, and trust that in stillness we are being changed.

People who regularly practise a form of silent prayer discover that they more naturally drop into prayer in day-to-day life, are enabled in focussing on the present moment, and respond more calmly to stressful situations.

# GSM Bellringers qualify for final



On 22 March, twelve GSM bellringers competed in the National Twelve Bell Striking Contest at Rotherham Minster. This was the first of two rounds of the competition, and I am pleased to say that we qualified for the final in Bristol in June. Eagle-eyed readers may recall that Cambridge hosted the final of this contest in 2018, when we came a very close second to

regular favourites Birmingham. The competition involves bands of bellringers from across the country each ringing exactly the same piece, lasting around ten minutes. The teams are judged on how rhythmical their ringing is. The goal is for the gaps between bells ringing to be as even as possible. Judging

is performed predominantly by humans, but with computational aids as well.

Whilst it is a competition, the day is about so much more than just ringing bells for a bit. Rather, it is a big social occasion, where one can catch up with friends from across the country, and make new ones. The hospitality at Rotherham was amazing, with food and drinks of all sorts flowing all day. We look forward to the final in June, where we shall face off against ringers from Bristol, Birmingham, London, and York, amongst others. I think I speak for all twelve of us when I say it is a huge honour to represent Cambridge in this way. We are very grateful to the Great St Mary's community for the support shown to us, and it is of course a massive privilege to ring on a Sunday for the services here.

### GSM Electoral Roll - PLEASE READ

#### New Electoral Roll for the Parish of St Mary the Great with St Michael, Cambridge

Every six years, we have to assemble an entirely new electoral roll, in accordance with Church Representation Rules. 2025 is such a year. Everybody who wishes to have their name on the new roll must apply to be enrolled. Joining the Electoral Roll is also a way of showing your support for Great St Mary's and to participate in the governance structures of the parish, if you wish to do so, as it is the register of lay persons who are eligible to vote at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) and to stand for election to the Parochial Church Council (PCC). Electoral roll forms need to be returned by **30 April at the latest**. This year's APCM will be held on Sunday 18 May, and the

#### new roll must be completed by then.

Church Rules require us to follow a very specific timetable, which will start with the display of a formal Notice in Great St Mary's and in Michaelhouse on Tuesday 11 March 2025. Applications, which can be made on paper or electronically, must be in the form specified. From 11 March a copy of that form can be accessed via a button on the home page of our website <u>www.greatstmarys.org</u> and there will be paper forms available in GSM and in Michaelhouse. The new Electoral Roll will be published on Friday 2 May, online and in hard copy in Great St Mary's and Michaelhouse. It will show names, but no other information, and must remain on display for at least 14 days prior to the APCM. Only those whose names are included in this new Electoral Roll will be entitled to stand for election or to vote at the APCM.

We hope that you will renew your membership of our Electoral Roll, or join for the first time. Please do not hesitate to contact the Electoral Roll Officer, Joanna Womack, or speak to the clergy, if you have any questions. It is really important that we gather together on the new Electoral Roll the names of all those who wish to exercise their rights in the Parish.
